The marathon course was mainly on sandy tracks through woodland. Unfortunately, the promised water obstacle was virtually non-existent, due to the very dry weather that we had in the run up to this event. The disappointment of this was more than compensated by the challenging obstacles our innovative team of course builders came up with that tested the driving skills of all competitors.

Full reports for each of these events are at the end of the newsletter, together with the League Tables, as they stand at present. Each of the competitions have had interesting results with newcomers Mike Charlesworth and Richard Wood finishing very strongly in everything they entered, frequently beating the Open drivers.

Apart from that and panic mode in obstacle one the old memory held out and Blue was fantastic. Definitely a three polo day!

The venue was beautiful. What a place to drive, though I'm glad I walked the course as there out there wasn't much time to admire the view whilst trying to spot yellow markers and red flags. The terrain was "catarrh-removing" but without the "are you still there" ruts we've been experiencing at home. After a few bouncy movements Blue kept up the same rhythmic trot all day (including in the dressage - tried to con Anne with a half halt at the end of the supposed extension: she did notice but it's worth a try!). He enjoyed it all. The obstacles were fair, gave us "please pass wide and slow" drivers plenty of room, with the chance of a few nippy corners for those who wanted.

Stewards at the obstacles were very encouraging and do a wonderful job, especially when the weather suddenly deteriorated. My only slightly negative observation is that in the absence of a driver we could have been encouraged to move times up, especially in the afternoon and possibly have closer start times as the obstacles were inviting and there was plenty of space between them. The ladies at the start - finish had to wait for the last competitor, poor Fay, whilst the rest of us stuck equines in lorries and scurried for cover. Lovely to see Fay come home with a huge smile on her face, though.

HACKTHORN SWISS DERBY 2012

The day promised to be busy with 6 competitors in each class. The dressage ran smoothly, with Anne Chambers judging and at the end of this section Jane Smith led the Novice class from Lucy Foster in 2nd and Judith Corker 3rd and Anna Sadler was in the lead in the Open class, with Sarah Daley in second position and Belinda Rees-Evans 3rd. There was only 3 points between these three competitors, so there was everything to play for in the Marathon.

After a brief rest for lunch, Carol Wood was first to go in the Marathon and set a time of 15:30 minutes for the other Open competitors to beat - a lead she held onto throughout. Mike took the first obstacle from Carol, with 3rd fastest time here going to Belinda. Obstacle two went to Mike again, with Sarah a close 2nd and Anna in 3rd. At obstacle three, the cones element in the shape of a Wave followed by a triangle, Mikes' luck ran out and this time it went to Sarah, with Carol hot on her heels and Belinda in 3rd. By this time it was becoming obvious it was going to be a closely run finish. At Obstacle four Belinda was the victor, with Sarah in 2nd and Mike taking 3rd only 3.32 seconds ahead of Anna. Unfortunately both Anna and Belinda picked up penalty points for course errors in Obstacles 1 and 2 respectively, which put them out of the running for a place. The final result was 1st place Sarah, 2nd place Mike, 3rd place Carol and 4th went to Sue.

The Novice Class was equally exciting with Mike Charlesworth leading the way in the marathon with a time of 15:10 - which was, incidentally best time of the day. Mike won the first obstacle from Jane Smith in 2nd and Richard Wood in 3rd. Mike also went on to win the next three obstacles, obstacle 2 saw Jane in 2nd and Judith 3rd. The 2nd fastest time at Obstacle 3 was Richard followed by Jane and in obstacle 4 again Richard took 2nd by .43 of a second from Judith. Again, it was a close finish with 1st going to Jane (helped by her exceptionally good dressage score), 2nd to Mike C and 3rd to Richard, with only 7.22 penalties splitting the 1st and 2nd places.

Nobody managed to get within the optimum times allowed - 15:93 minutes for Novice and Under 12.2hh, 13:66 minutes for the Open.

It was lovely to see such a big turnout of spectators - it has been many years since we've experienced such a gathering!! The weather held until about half past three, about 3 minutes after the last competitor, Faye, set out on the course and the heavens opened!! Well done for carrying on and completing the course in such an awful deluge!!

Whilst the course was being cleared and the final scores put together, tea, coffee, cake and biscuits were on offer under the trailer awning. Thank you to Carole who baked the delicious Plum Bread. It was amazing how many people could fit into such a small place at the same time.

The award for Best Groom of the Day went to Anna, who groomed for Jane. Had there been an award for Best Sport of the Day it would surely have gone to Faye, who, having received a soaking out on the course was subject to another one when the awning was being carefully relieved of the water that had gathered, it went the wrong way and poured, as if from a large bucket, straight over poor Faye!!

As usual, the event could not run without the many volunteers that steward for us, for which we owe a big Thank You. Also, a big Thank You to Geoff and Liz who kindly gave their day up to take some super pictures of the event and stayed out in the rain taking pictures until the last competitor came through the final obstacle!! BAGMOOR ONE DAY EVENT 2012

The starting entry for this venue was 8 but unfortunately Carol had to withdraw due to a rather painful injury to her leg sustained during the previous week. Due to the small numbers entered it was decide to run this as a single class with some very surprising results - methinks that this years' Open drivers need to watch out for some very competent Novice drivers coming up through the ranks!!! The dressage ran smoothly, despite the arena having to be slightly abridged due to lack of space, since the original area had not been cut in time for the event. This was more than compensated by the fact that it drove like a bowling green with only very slight undulation.

Richard Wheeldon was our judge for the day and at the end of this section Sue Mart led the class from Richard Wood in 2nd and Mike Charlesworth 3rd. The cones section followed straight on from the dressage, and this section was won by Mike C on 21 penalties, with Richard Wood 2nd on 25 penalties and Belinda Rees-Evans 29 penalties.

At the end of the dressage and cones the placings were Mike C 1st, Richard W 2nd, Mike L 3rd with only 1.5 penalties splitting 1st and 2nd places so the heat was on for the marathon.

After a brief rest for lunch, Sue Lawson was first to go in the Marathon and set a time of 19 minutes for the other competitors to beat - a lead she held onto until, Mike Lawson, pipped her into 2nd fastest time on 17 minutes. Mike C took the first obstacle from Belinda, with 3rd fastest time here going to Mike L. Obstacle two went to Mike C again, with Sue M 2nd and Belinda in 3rd. Mike C's luck still held in Obstacle three, with 2nd place going to Sue M and 3rd to Richard following closely behind. By this time it was becoming obvious it was going to be a closely run finish. At Obstacle four Mike C completed his winning streak, with Mike L in 2nd and Sue M taking 3rd only .34 of a second ahead of Sue L.

The final result was 1st place Mike C, 2nd place Mike L, 3rd place Richard and 4th went to Sue M.

Nobody managed to be spot on the optimum times allowed - 20.83 minutes for Novice and Under 12.2hh, 17.85 minutes for the Open, although both Mike C and Mike L came within .37 and .85 of a minute respectively.

There was a good turnout of spectators and the weather kept fair although there was a rumble of thunder at end of the afternoon.

Again, whilst the course was being cleared and the final scores put together, tea, coffee, cake and biscuits were on offer under the trailer awning.

As usual, the event could not run without the many volunteers that steward for us, for which we owe a big Thank You. Also, thank you to Sophie Nash who took some lovely pictures at obstacle 2. These are now up on the website.

Hopefully we'll see you all at Beelsby on the 9th September for the Swiss Derby.

BEELSBY SWISS DERBY 2012

Due to various circumstances, relating to either to equine or human incapacity, numbers for this event dwindled to 5 by Sunday morning, so, once again the class combined both Novice and Open competitors.

The day got progressively hotter as it wore on but this was kept to a bearable heat with a (sometimes very gusty) breeze. For those of you who have never been to this venue, it is situated on the top of the Wolds with stunning views on one side towards Grimsby - the other side is obscured by trees. The Club is extremely grateful to the landowner who allows us to hold an event at such a very beautiful venue.

The marathon, including the Obstacles, was approximately 5.25 kilometres, mainly along undulating farm tracks, starting and finishing on grassland. The first obstacle was in the field about 500 metres from the start, competitors then went out into the countryside and returned to the field where they completed the final 3 obstacles. As is usual for a Swiss Derby, there is no Cones section but a cones obstacle. This element consisted of a serpentine of 6 cones, each 3 metres apart, followed by a set of 4 pairs of cones set at 145cms laid out as a wave with a weave. Only 1 competitor, Sue Lawson, managed to go clear through this. Well done, Sue!

Wendy Stromberg was our Dressage judge for the day and at the end of this section Richard Wood led the class from Mike Charlesworth in 2nd with Mike Lawson and Judith Corker in 3rd. Only 7 penalties separated the first place from the 5th place, so at the end of this section it was still anybody's race.

To-days' event was going to decide who was the overall winner of the Combined League, so the heat was on to see if Mike Lawson would have a low enough penalty score to knock Mike Charlesworth off his perch at the top of the table.

Sue Lawson was first to go in the Marathon and set a time of 28.08 minutes for the other competitors to beat - a lead she held onto until Mike Lawson came home in 26.36 minutes, who was then promptly ousted into 2nd fastest time by Mike Charlesworth in a time of 26.15 - only 0.12 under the Novice optimum time. Mike C took the first obstacle from Richard, with 3rd fastest time here going to Mike L. Obstacle two went to Mike C again, with Mike L 2nd and Richard in 3rd. Mike C's luck faltered in Obstacle three, the Cones element, with fastest time going to Richard, although he picked up 15 penalties, Mike Lawson was 2nd fastest, also picking up 15 penalties, 3rd fastest time went to Mike C, who picked up 10 penalties. At Obstacle four Mike C's luck returned, taking 1st, with Mike L 2nd and Sue 3rd, only .03 of a second ahead of Richard and Judith who tied on 60.05 seconds.

Once again, Mike C proved unstoppable, as he has all season and the final result was 1st place Mike C, 2nd place Richard, and 3rd place, by 1.87 penalties was Mike L. The award for Best Groom of the Day was awarded to Sally Ironmonger.

Once again, the Novice drivers have shown the Open drivers the way home!!

The tea, coffee and cakes that have been on offer under the awning at the end of each event has proved to be a popular and valuable social event. As usual, the event could not run without the many volunteers that steward for us, to whom we owe a big THANK YOU.
